

VDS HULL DESIGN

Easy Rider

Sailfish Boats' unique Variable Degree Stepped hull delivers unbeatable ride quality, proving three hulls are better than one.

Ride quality is an aspect of boating that has a tremendous impact on your overall experience. A boat's hull determines how well it interacts with the forces of water, whether it's slicing through chop, deflecting spray, balancing steadily or carving a turn. There should be no shortcuts when it comes to hull design; every curve and plane should be shaped with intention, and with the end result — a smooth, dry, satisfying ride — in mind.

When people hear "stepped hull," they often picture a side profile shot showing an abrupt change in the running surface from bow to stern. With Sailfish, "stepped" refers to the progression from the keel outward to the spray rails. In other words, it's best observed from the rear, or in a sliced cross-section view. The unique design of Sailfish's exclusive Variable Degree Stepped (VDS) hull features three distinct running surfaces in one, each with its own purpose.

"The traditional stepped hull would start somewhere after midship and run toward the transom. The shape of the V itself is just a straight line, whatever the deadrise is," explains Denny Warren, Sailfish Sales & Transportation Manager. "That kind of form has only one function: running with the throttles wide open. The Sailfish VDS hull, in contrast, performs different functions at different speeds, as well as at rest. You're essentially getting three hulls in one."

Starting from the outside in, the "flattest" surface of the hull, at 22°, provides comfort and stability by helping to keep the boat level. Reverse chines add lift and stability, while helping turn away water that would otherwise ride up the sides and splash those onboard. Higher up, the hull's wide bow flare provides another layer of dryness protection, blocking water from blowing into the boat.

"With a straight V hull, it does well in motion, but at rest, you'll have all this instability, rocking uncomfortably back and forth," Denny says. "Our

variable degree design fixes that problem. That cuts down on seasickness, too, making it more family-friendly and a more appealing option for fishing."

Moving inward, the second surface is positioned at a slightly shallower angle of 23°, enabling air to flow efficiently under the hull. This aeration ensures less friction and brings a welcome higher rate of fuel economy. "Picture a seagull's wing," Denny says. "It has an outline that curves inward at small points under its arc. Its surface is constantly changing. We mimic this in our hull design to create points of aeration and reduce drag." (If the seagull analogy doesn't fully capture the meaning, then cost-saving receipts at the fuel pump will.)

The sharpest-angled section, a 24° surface at the bottom of the hull, glides cleanly through the water, even in rough seas. At the proverbial tip of the spear, a steep 48° to 58° deadrise slices through the water as the boat makes its entry. You'll feel this most noticeably in rougher conditions; a Sailfish handles choppy water effortlessly, instilling a sense of confidence and trust that you'll always get home safely.

"One of the many benefits of the VDS hull is that you really don't slam into the waves when you're coming off and you catch some air," Denny says. "A Sailfish hull comes down and cuts like a knife, and then it has this kind of soft settle to it, like a gentle landing with each step. That's where it's catching those outer hulls."

A smoother landing is something every passenger can appreciate. "When you're offshore and you're trying to get back fast, the VDS hull is going to allow you to maybe take a little higher speed than you normally would with some other boats, because you're not going to

have that pounding action when you've got your family loaded up for a fishing trip," notes Sailfish Design Engineer Michael Brown.

Never content to rest on success, the Sailfish team is continually studying its boats and looking for ways to refine and improve. Over the years, its hull design has evolved to deliver better performance than ever. Now in its sixth generation, today's VDS hull features slightly more spray rail and a harder "turn-down" angle on the chines.

"The reverse chine is where you get your water management," Denny explains. "If water sticks to the sides, it wants to ride all the way up the hull and spray your passengers. Our hulls turn down and kick the water out."

When it comes to delivering superior ride quality, Sailfish combines form and function to prove that three hulls are definitely better than one.

CRAFTED TO PERFORM

Stalwart Stringers

At the heart of every Sailfish boat is a strong, smart foundation.

Boat manufacturers can talk all day about fancy features or deluxe options. But ultimately the integrity of any boat comes down to its hull — and the integrity of any hull lies in its robust stringer system. Sailfish doesn't cut corners or allow room for error in boatbuilding, starting with this all-important grid structure.

"The stringer system is the backbone that we build our premium product on," explains Denny Warren, Sailfish's sales and transportation manager. "The bulkheads are like ribs, and the main beams are like the spine."

Sailfish uses computer-aided design (CAD) to model its hulls. The engineering team then combines forces with the experts at Compsys to design a stringer system unique to Sailfish. Bulkheads, main beams and cross members fit together like a jigsaw puzzle. "It goes together one way and one way only," Warren says. "So it's a perfect fit each time."

A stringer system gives a hull its strength, but strength in a fishing boat can't equal heavy. Excess weight creates issues with ride, speed, holeshot and fuel efficiency, to name a few. A robust stringer system allows a hull to be built lighter, which is why the construction of the system is so crucial.

To make Sailfish stringers, Compsys pours two-part closed-cell foam into a mold. Once the foam cures, they remove it and then adhere a layer of quad axial mat, comprised of four layers of woven and stitched fiberglass material. "Each layer is turned 90 degrees, so you have full strength at 360 degrees," Warren notes.

After adding quad axial fiberglass layup to the hull interior, Sailfish then sets the foamfilled and fiberglass-laid stringer system jigsaw puzzle into the hull. Technicians place the main beams first, followed by the cross beams. They then wet the entire system with resin, carefully laying, rolling and patting it down by hand so that it conforms directly to the hull.

The Sailfish method differs from other boat manufacturers in its level of precision. Warren explains: "The traditional way of doing it, like many of our competitors do, is that they'll have a one-piece stringer mold that they'll spray with a resin and lay in the fiberglass."

After they pop the stringer out of the mold, they place it in the hull and then drill holes to inject a closed-cell foam. "But they're relying on a human to make a 1.2-second shot or a 2.3-second shot, in various areas, to expand that foam out to fill the stringer system," Warren says. "That leaves room for human error to inject either too much or not enough foam."

When a stringer system lacks enough foam, voids fill with air and compromise hull integrity. If the foam expands too much, it can either push the stringer out or push the hull

down. "With our method," Warren says, "it's perfectly formed foam with glass wrapped around it, each and every time. We don't leave room for human error in the process."


Additionally, some manufacturers use marine-grade pressure-treated plywood for all or part of their stringer system grid. There's nothing wrong with the wood itself, Warren says, as long as it's 100% encapsulated with resin and fiberglass so that no moisture can get in. But this is another area where human error can come into play. "Once water gets in there," Warren explains, "it will expand." If you live in a cold environment, freezing can also cause expansion and degrade the integrity of the fiberglass and the hull.

You won't find *any* wood in a Sailfish stringer system — or anywhere else on a Sailfish, for that matter. What you get is a hull made entirely of composite materials, reinforced with Kevlar® and carbon fiber. Composite materials have very minimal expansion and contraction, eliminating the variables that come with wood. Hulls are then finished with premium resin and gelcoats to prevent any fiberglass scarring or degrading that could lead to water seepage and blistering. No wood means zero risk of rot or warp. And Sailfish

backs its hulls with a 10-year limited warranty and a lifetime no-rot guarantee.

The built-tough hulls on every Sailfish are the result of more than 35 years of precision engineering and testing boats in all manner of inshore and offshore conditions. "You always have the option to go offshore," Warren says, "but you have to come back." Sailfish makes sure you will, and it all starts with a secure foundation: the stalwart Sailfish stringer system.

The foam-filled stringer system adds rigidity and safety. And hulls and every showing surface are finished with the highest quality gelcoats. The Sailfish quality control team may be the most important employees in the facility. "It explains how we can offer a 10-year hull warranty," Denny says, "but it's also how we know we are taking care of our owners, no matter what they get themselves into."

Each Sailfish model is designed from the start for trouble-free operation and easy access to everything you need to have a productive fishing day. When you reach for something, it's there — from rod holders, cupholders and hand-holds to switches, latches and toe rails. All hinges and deck lids are recessed into the mounting surface, providing added safety for your feet, while freeboard and bolsters are at an ideal height for pumping rods or reaching over to boat or release your catch.

Inside & Out

Sailtech Construction is the secret behind every Sailfish boat's lasting durability and unmistakable quality.

What makes a strong foundation? It starts with strong materials, of course; materials proven to withstand the expected and unexpected forces likely to act on them over the years.

It also requires a rock-solid skeleton — some type of grid or backbone that will faithfully support whatever is applied on top of it. You'll need a team of experienced professionals to assemble these components properly, people with an abiding respect for accuracy and precision. And you can't forget to test the work, repeatedly and with an open mind, so that any flaws are caught before they become major issues.

By this definition, every Sailfish boat begins with a strong foundation: Sailtech Construction, a set of techniques the company has honed and perfected over the years. Sailtech unites science, materials and human touch to build lasting structural integrity into each and every hull. This, in turn, gives you the confidence to pursue all your on-water goals, knowing your boat won't let you down.

The process of building a Sailfish hull using Sailtech Construction starts from the outside in. An outer gelcoat is the first material to be applied. Gelcoat is likely what you think of when you picture a gleaming powerboat in the marina; it's the hard-as-nails surface that gives a Sailfish its head-turning shine. With six colors to choose from, including classic white and tasteful shades of blue, green and gray, Sailfish's gelcoat palette gives customers a way to express their personal style from all the way across the harbor.

Moving inward, the next layer to be applied is a "skin out," or skin coat of fiberglass, followed by a layer of spray core, a ceramic spray that serves as a heat shield barrier. This important coat protects the hull from heat generated during the applications of fiberglass and resin to follow.

The spray core layer is then prepped for the lamination of overlapping layers of quad axial fiberglass mat. (Say that ten times fast...) This unique mat consists of four layers of woven and stitched fiberglass material, each turned 90 degrees as they're laid atop one another, to provide a full 360 degrees of strength.

Next, a high-density, closed-cell foam embedded with fiberglass called COOSA board is clamped into place at the transom. COOSA is ten times stronger than any wood transom, yet lighter weight and impervious to water damage. You'll notice a trend here — Sailtech Construction relies on materials that are remarkably strong but that don't add unnecessary weight. That's because an overly heavy boat is not a high-performance boat; moreover, a heavy fishing boat limits holeshot and fuel efficiency, making it a drag to fish or play from. Conversely, lighter-weight strength equals less gas, more range and more fun.

After the COOSA transom board has cured, it's time to install Sailfish's robust stringer system, which forms an all-important grid structure inside the boat. Sailfish uses computer-aided design (CAD) to model its hulls, then works with the experts at Compsys to craft precision-fit stringers. Two-part closed-cell foam, wrapped with quad axial fiberglass mat, creates the bulkheads, beams and cross members that are laid meticulously by hand and secured into place to create a consistent, strong fit each and every time. All parts of the stringer system are engineered to add minimal

weight, ensuring peak performance. (For more on the unique philosophy and makeup of Sailfish stringers, turn to page 12.)

Once the stringer system is in place, the transom is tied in with Kevlar®, a lightweight synthetic fiber that delivers high tensile strength with very minimal expansion and

contraction. (Yes, it's the same material used in the creation of bulletproof vests... just don't take aim at your Sailfish.) Used to bolster structural integrity, Kevlar is applied at the three major stress points in the hull: the forward section of the keel, which cuts through the water and bears the brunt of smacking

waves; and the transom, where the engines exert considerable pressure. By reinforcing these stress points, Sailfish creates a more durable boat that will perform beautifully and hold its value for many, many years to come.

Underneath the deck, Sailfish uses PRISMA preform beams, which are lightweight closedcell foam beams laminated with fiberglass composite, with strips of carbon fiber added for increased strength and longevity. They are applied from port to starboard under the bottom side of the deck, much like a floor joint, to provide lasting structural support and eliminate any "spongy" feeling underfoot. (If you've ever walked on a boat and gotten the unnerving sense that you're bouncing, it's time you stepped aboard a Sailfish — you'll never go back.)

Near the end of the Sailtech Construction process, technicians apply a felt-like material called Trevira at the top of the hull side, around the pinning flange. This high-tech material is woven with fiberglass strands, enhancing its durability. Once coated with resin and cured, it has the strength of aluminum for screw retention. In other words, anything attached via screw will hold firmly in place.

Aside from the gelcoat on the outside, you'll probably never actually see any of these components; they're neatly hidden below the boat's deck. Yet Sailtech Construction is, without a doubt, the secret sauce that gives a Sailfish its trustworthy quality and dependable reputation. Just like a well-built foundation, a Sailfish hull will support generations of happy memories.

Radio personality Eric Brandon knows a thing or two about fishing. He's hosted his Saturday-morning program, The Weekly Fisherman Show, for 16 years and counting, and in that time has spoken with countless pros from all over the South Florida region. That's on top of the sizeable experience he's amassed during his own decades of fishing adventures.

Every week, Eric and his cohost, angler Joe

Hector, field live call-ins from celebrity captains and guest speakers who share their local fishing tips and success stories from the past week. They'll have friendly debates over what qualifies as a "slammer," whether

or not using "candy" (live bait) is cheating, and who's got the most skill with a gaff. In a given episode, you might learn everything from how to work a deep-diving shad rap, to whose

football team has the best prospects for the weekend's game. It's the kind of freewheeling, easygoing conversation you'd have with your college buddies, full of wisecracking and good-natured one-upmanship.

Between captain interviews, listeners dial in to quiz the knowledgeable hosts on tips, techniques, hot spots and more, picking their brains for the latest intel on what's biting and

> where. It's the perfect platform for dispensing and gaining wisdom, and it's given Eric quite the broad perspective on the sport.

> "It's just fantastic hearing from all these people who have a passion and a

talent for fishing," he says in the dulcet tones of a seasoned broadcaster. "We get to know their tricks, their backgrounds, their stories, and we get to share it all with our listeners."

The 272 CC gives the group plenty of room to spread out and work their lines. Twin Yamaha outboards provide the strong, reliable power to get them on the fish and back home again.

The radio program is sponsored by Nautical Ventures, a popular Sailfish dealer with locations in North Palm Beach, Sarasota, and Tampa Bay, with a marquis showroom in Fort Lauderdale. Eric's long-running relationship with the Nautical Ventures team has kept him well-informed when it comes to the latest fishing boats, illustrating the key factors that separate the ho-hum options from the true fishing machines. It's also nice to have a finger on the pulse of marine propulsion and technology, like the powerful Yamaha and Mercury four-stroke outboard engines offered by Sailfish.

Eric recalls the moment when he first came to appreciate the Sailfish brand. "The dealership took two Sailfish boats on consignment, both 27-footers. They sold within two days because they were that beautiful," he says. "That's when I learned how well they rode. We went out on a sea trial in 4-foot swells, and the boat handled like a champ."

It wasn't long before Eric took delivery of his own Sailfish, a 272 Center Console model loaded with features and options tailored for (you guessed it) fishing. Several times a month, he and friends or family members take the boat out, cutting through Broward County's Hillsboro Inlet and heading 12 to 15 miles straight offshore in search of mahi-mahi and tuna, grouper and snapper... essentially, whatever's biting. "I've caught more sailfish over the years than I could possibly keep," he says. "That said, we do love to bring home fish to eat. We grill everything. A little garlic salt, butter, lemon and lime... there's nothing better."

From the cutting-edge Garmin GPSMap system and ergonomic dash layout, to the well-equipped tackle station leaning post, to the twin in-floor fish boxes and circulating baitwell, this boat thrives on

the hunt for game. "It's a phenomenal fishing platform," he raves. "Dry ride, spacious, right mix of features, great on gas with the Yahama engines. All-around excellent."

Another major perk of choosing a Sailfish is that your boat will do more than just fish —

way more. Center consoles like Eric's 272 CC are designed with both dedicated anglers and fun-loving families in mind, with plenty of comfortable seating and amenities that keep even the youngest or most timid passengers safe and happy. Eric explains, "The way a Sailfish is

designed, you've got a serious side at the back end of the boat you can get all bloody and juicy. After a morning of fishing, you hose it out, load up the family and park it on a sandbar. It couldn't be easier."

The 272 CC features Sailfish's sixth-generation Variable Degree Stepped (VDS) hull, designed to harness the forces of water and

maximize performance in a wide range of conditions. Count on a smooth, stable ride that parents, grandparents, novice and experienced boaters alike will feel good about — and hole shot that even the most dedicated tournament angler can appreciate.

The special configuration of a VDS hull allows onboard space to be more fully optimized, as well. As a result, Sailfish features the deepest cockpit depth in its class, engineered to keep your loved ones in and the water out. No matter what activity you're engaged in—fighting a monster sailfish or tuna, watching your lines for a bite, or kicking back in the bow with a favorite book—the boat's higher freeboard will keep you and everyone else onboard feeling more protected and secure.

Additional features contribute to Sailfish's sterling reputation for safety and quality, including strategically placed bow rails and plenty of easy-to-clean dot-matrix, non-skid decking. Further, Sailfish features oversized recessed cockpit drains, which allows the

maximum amount of water to exit the deck and provides an extra level of passenger protection.

In large part because of these unique design aspects, Eric feels confident in bringing his two sons, grandson and granddaughter along on fishing trips, knowing everyone will make it out and back safely. They're likely to be more content, too, thanks to they-thought-of-everything details like the Fusion stereo system with Wet Sounds LED lighted speakers, built-in actuated bow backrests, a large head compartment with electric toilet, a standard freshwater shower at the transom, and even a small built-in cooler in the swim platform, perfect for playing at a sandbar or floating around. "Most people don't use the head, but the grandkids do," he says with a smile. "All of these comfort features come in handy, regardless of whether we're fishing hard or hanging with the family."

Hosting the radio program hadn't necessarily been Eric's dream, but in hindsight it's a natural fit. Originally, a friend who worked in sports radio approached him with the idea of hosting a Saturday morning talk show about fishing. Eric was game, and *The Weekly Fisherman* was born. Over the years,

he and his cohosts have demonstrated their passion for talking to people and finding out about their experiences, forming a real connection with audiences that continues to fuel the show's growth. In fact, they have recently expanded to new outlets, adding a YouTube channel, Instagram Live stories, and podcast platforms including iTunes and iHeartRadio. They're constantly on the lookout for new guests with a fresh perspective, bringing more female captains and younger fans into the fold.

"Every single weekend, we learn about some new technique or fish or something we hadn't encountered or even heard of before," Eric says. "That's the great thing — with fishing, there's always something new to talk about."

And as long as he keeps putting that Sailfish 272 CC to good use, his personal stash of fish tales is guaranteed to keep getting bigger.

Thanks to their intelligent use of space and the unique configuration of the Sailfish hull, they also feel remarkably roomy for their size.

While these three boats can certainly get down to the serious business of fishing, they also provide all the comfort and amenities for families to enjoy a fun-filled day on the water. The optional Comfort Package adds bow cushions, a forward-facing backrest and rear jump seats, giving passengers great places to stretch out and relax, and there's plenty of smart storage to keep belongings out from underfoot. An optional Entertainment Package is available, adding a removable bow table, underwater lights, a transom remote, and Sailfish's exclusive recessed ski tow bar. Each Center Console also has the tallest head compartment in its class, thanks to the clever design of the brand's stringer systems.

For its part, the Sailfish 220 CC is a standout in the 22-foot center console market, delivering top-notch ride quality in smooth and rough seas. (Sailfish's Variable Degree Stepped hull design sees to that.) An intuitive dash accommodates large flush-mounted electronics. Additional fishing features include twin insulated 224-quart bow fish boxes, a 25-gallon circulating baitwell, built-in tackle storage, and an impressive 10 standard rod holders located strategically throughout the boat. (Similarly, you're never more than a step or two away from a cup holder.) The boat's compact size makes it easily towable to fishing holes near and far.

Tested with a single F200 Yamaha engine, the 220 CC performed admirably, reaching a top speed of 46.2 mph at 5,900 rpm, with the best cruise coming in at 3,500 rpm and 22.9 mph. Its VDS hull sliced through chop like butter and delivered great stability through every turn.

Next up, the 241 CC beautifully demonstrates the winning Sailfish formula: proven Sailtech construction methods, precision engineering, and the latest innovations in design. This center console fishing platform offers a highly functional layout, with a practical mix of features that get the job done right. Aft flip-up bolster seating, a cockpit leaning post with flip-up bolsters, and a spacious bow give anglers multiple positions from which to wrestle a catch.

Equipped with a single 250-hp Yamaha XCA engine, the 241 CC achieved its best cruise at 29.9 mph, with top speeds over 42 mph at 5,800 rpm — plenty of "oomph" to satisfy offshore anglers and pleasure boaters alike.

Third in a lineup of seven powerful center console models is the 242 CC, a fishing boat built for extreme offshore anglers. Stepping aboard, you immediately notice how big the boat feels. This spaciousness owes itself, in large part, to the boat's class-leading 9-footwide beam. The trademark VDS hull delivers

incredible performance and smooth, dry ride, while also being one of the most fuel-efficient hulls in its class. A standard 30-gallon transom livewell lets fishermen carry a full day's worth of fresh bait, while ample rod holders, rod storage, tackle storage and toe-rails ensure ultimate convenience and safety.

Count on the 242 CC to get you where the fish are, fast, and back home safely again. As with every model, Sailfish offers a choice of Mercury and Yamaha engines, allowing boaters to select the power configuration that best matches their needs, goals and location. When tested with twin Yamaha 150-hp XCA engines, the 242 reached a top speed at 5,900 rpm of 52.5 mph, and breezed along at 33.9 mph at 4,000 rpm.

All three models feature Sailfish's unique dot-matrix non-skid flooring, which not only provides great traction, but also makes it easy to clean off blood and slime after an action-packed trip. Additional safety comes

thanks to the boats' high freeboard, letting you work a fish without ever feeling like you're going to topple overboard. Hinges and deck lids are recessed into the mounting surface, preventing stubbed toes and stumbles. Thoughtful design reigns.

It's easy to see why serious anglers rely on the 220, 241 and 242 Center Console for their fishing needs. Hassle-free operation, pragmatic features, ergonomic layouts, convenient access... like the best caddies, it's almost as if these boats could read your mind.

FLAGSHIP OF THE FLEET: THE 360 GG

SAILFISH'S LARGEST CENTER CONSOLE MODEL DELIVERS BIG-TIME CAPABILITY AND COMFORT TO MATCH.

boasts an impressive footprint to match its elegant profile. The flagship of the Sailfish lineup epitomizes the company's commitment to building hardcore fishing boats that double as a highly comfortable platform for family cruising, with a level of versatility matched by superior attention to detail.

For examples of this, look no further than the 360 CC's bow, where comfortable U-shaped seating comes complete with a removable multi-position backrest. This allows passengers to ride naturally facing forward, but also swings fully out of the way, flush into a side-bolster position that clears the way for fishing. The bow seating lifts to reveal two 80-quart insulated storage boxes, and another 80-quart fish box can be found in the bow deck.

Versatility also comes courtesy of the bow area's power-adjustable platform, which raises from the deck to support a bow filler cushion, making it an ideal spot to catch rays. The deck can also be raised higher to serve as a table and host snacks, meals or card games.

Storage abounds, with a massive lockable coffin box forward of the console, hidden neatly beneath the bow's plush lounge seating with foldaway armrests and cup holders. For stashing everything from extra towels and lifejackets to 5-gallon buckets and spare fenders, the 360 CC can contain it all. The bow also has a Fusion stereo remote, so passengers can adjust the soundtrack and volume without having to leave their seats.

In the cockpit, boaters will find more room to spread out and relax. Three-across aft-facing seating with fold-down armrests and cup holders provides a great place to sit and chat or keep an eye on fishing lines or others hanging out in the water. And here's where Sailfish proves it's more than meets the eye: The design

team cleverly mounted an optional 9-inch fishfinder behind the center seat, so anglers can monitor their fishing terrain right from the cockpit. Fold all three seatbacks down to reveal large tackle storage compartments. Beneath the seat on the starboard side is a 32-gallon circulating livewell with pressurized pumps, paired with a convenient cooler-storage compartment beneath the bench.

Alternatively, customers can choose the optional utility cabinet configuration, which replaces the aft-facing seats with a Corian countertop, freshwater sink, electric grill, bait station and additional tackle storage, as well as a starboard refrigerator and portside storage drawers.

With either configuration, the boat comes standard with a fold-out bench at the transom and an optional fold-down starboard-side seat, providing both extra places to sit and extra room to maneuver. Whatever that perfect day on the water looks like, the 360 CC offers the space and amenities to make it a reality.

When looking to get out of the sun, the 360 CC is well-equipped. Inside the helm console compartment, a roomy, lockable cabin area features a cushioned sleeping pad that's perfect for afternoon naps. The cabin also provides the creature comforts of a covered head, Corian countertops, wood cabinets, mirrors and stand-up freshwater shower.

More purposeful amenities include two indeck, 260-quart insulated vacuum-pump fish boxes and a transom 42-gallon livewell. And did we mention the boat features 34 standard rod holders?

Sailfish didn't forget about the captain's needs, either: The helm console is remarkably intuitive, with a power-vent windshield for uninterrupted visibility, and a panel large enough to accommodate two 16-inch or three 12-inch electronic screens. Like all Sailfish center consoles, trim tab controls are strategically positioned so that the captain doesn't have to take his or her hand off the throttle to control the attitude and angle of the boat when in chop. The optional joystick steering system makes for effortless docking and maneuvering through tight spaces, while an optional dash air-conditioning system keeps everyone cool, calm and comfortable on even the hottest days.

Ergonomic three-across helm seating features a power-adjustable center seat, an anti-fatigue floor mat, a well-positioned footrest,



and a multi-level standing helm platform. All three helm row seats feature foldaway armrests and fold-down bolsters, maximizing comfort for captains and first mates of all sizes.

Another great aspect of the helm is the console-top organizer with see-through lid, a feature that virtually guarantees boaters will never lose their keys, sunglasses or phones while onboard. (Devices can be charged while at sea, too, thanks to two USB charging ports.)

The boat's expansive hardtop includes a vented sunroof and vented windshield complete with a washer system and wipers. Additional features of the hardtop include twin electronics boxes, switchable lights that shine white or blue, stereo speakers, four rod holders, and optional outrigger pads.

It's readily apparent that the 360 CC was designed for the full gamut of on-water activities. A convenient built-in dive door, complete with an in-deck fold-out ladder and grab handle, makes it easy to haul in a big catch, or provide swimmers and divers easy access from the water. Overhead, a standard built-in power-actuating sunshade projects from the hardtop to provide extra sun protection. Underfoot, Sailfish's exclusive dot-matrix non-skid flooring helps prevent wet feet from slipping and

allows for quick cleanup at the end of the day.

Like every Sailfish, the 360 Center Console features the brand's exclusive Variable Degree Stepped hull, combining three angles of deadrise to ensure safety, stability and a smooth, dry, satisfying ride. At a class-leading 24°, the sharpest-angled section of the hull slices cleanly through chop, with powerful performance thanks to a choice of triple Yamaha or Mercury engines. This design also contributes to the boat's safety, opening up deeper gunwales and creating a greater sense of being tucked securely inside.

And because it's a Sailfish, the 360 CC is built using the company's proprietary Sailtech Construction method, which employs state-of-theart materials and techniques to create long-lasting strength, reliability and durability. This, in turn, gives boaters the ability to head offshore with confidence, knowing their boat will rise to any occasion and always get them back safely.

The reviewers at BoatTest.com summed things up nicely when they noted that "operating the Sailfish 360 CC should give the operator a feeling of confidence in obtaining any offshore objective or simply entertaining family and friends."

WHEN IT COMES TO RELIABLE PERFORMANCE AND AMPLE ONBOARD SPACE, THE 290 AND 320 CC ARE A WISE INVESTMENT.

For proof that Sailfish boats are designed by anglers, for anglers, you don't need to look any further than the 290 and 320 CC. These brawny and highly capable center console models serve up loads of standard fishing features in ergonomic layouts perfect for reeling in catch after catch. Not only that, but they're also incredibly comfortable and versatile, making them an excellent option for anglers intent on enjoying the water with family and friends, as well.

Even from a distance, the CC models' fishing ability is readily apparent. The 290 and 320 each feature 12 standard rod holders, strategically placed within arm's reach from just about anywhere on the boat. An expansive beam -9 on the 290 and a whopping 10 on the 320 combines with class-leading bow and cockpit depth and high coaming bolsters to create a sense of safety and security within the boat, along with tons of room to maneuver.

Both boats include a large, open bow seating area, with a convenient cooler seat forward of the helm that can be removed to create even more space. The 290 CC is available with an optional aft folding seat that accommodates up to two adults, while the 320 CC offers a 58"-wide version; both seats fold neatly out of the way when not in use to allow for open-cockpit fishing. Mid-ship, a row of two ergonomic captain's chairs back up to a wellequipped leaning post, standard with a 35-gallon livewell, a sink with faucet and two drawers of storage, or choose an available built-in tackle station to replace the additional livewell with more storage.


Rest assured that if all those fishing features are put to use, the Sailfish CCs have plenty of room to store the results: Underfoot, two infloor fish boxes, complete with a Grouper Gulper discharge system, welcome a full day's worth of catches.

For anglers looking to step up their game even further, the 290 and 320 offer the Offshore Tournament Package options, which add a beautiful powder-coated white hardtop with PFD storage and transom rod holders. An optional acrylic enclosure is also available to provide greater all-weather protection. The large standard dash area features full digital instrumentation, with a panel that accommodates Garmin electronics. As with every Sailfish CC, controls are intuitively placed for the captain's convenience.

Sailfish understands that today's boaters want versatility, and that includes being able to enjoy leisurely days of cruising, beaching or playing with family and friends. The 290 and 320 CC see to every passenger's comfort, with smart amenities including a large head area with shower/storage and an electric head with dockside pump-out or overboard discharge capabilities. Other smart touches include a console top organizer with dual USB charging ports, giving boaters a secure place to keep phones, wallets, glasses, keys and other valuables. The console top organizer is in keeping with Sailfish's commitment to providing ample space to stash anything brought aboard. On the 290 and 320 CC, this includes footrest console storage, infloor bow storage with bucket holder, recessed rod storage (port and starboard), and vanity and net storage in the head.

In sum, there's no doubt about it: The Sailfish 290 and 320 CC prove that a serious offshore fishing boat can also deliver serious comfort, versatility and convenience.

Kimberly purchased her Sailfish at the Atlantic City Boat Show, where it was basically love at first sight. From the versatile dual console layout with ample seating and storage, to the sleek lines of the hull, to the amenities that made it well-equipped for action-packed days, the 276 DC checked all the boxes. Extras like a standard thru-hull anchor system, spacious head with Corian countertops, extended transom with exterior cooler, and optional dive door with ladder combined to form something she knew she needed s'more of in her future.

"The way the boat's configured, it's just so comfortable. You can sit 12 people easily," she says. That capacity makes it great for social gatherings; sometimes she'll head out with a group of girlfriends and cruise to dinner, or take friends out for a day of wakeboarding. "So I'll take them tubing, but we also go crabbing, fishing, and beaching. We use it so much. My husband comes home half the time and he looks out back and sees the boat's off the lift and the house is empty."


Of course, her husband, Christopher, joins in the fun too, especially when they head down to Florida where they keep their second home, a 56-foot sport yacht. When the kids are off school, the family enjoys cruising down to The Bahamas and island-hopping.

But more than chartering, she appreciates how much her captain's training courses and Master 100 Ton certification have given her the confidence, expertise and freedom to explore far and wide.

"I would tell anybody who's looking for a boat for their family and they like to fish and also go cruising and go to the beach and all of that, this model is the perfect boat," Kimberly says. "It has so much storage for everything you want to do. I mean, we have big floaties and things to blow up the floaties, a beach umbrella, beach table, tow lines, blankets and towels, and it all fits into the storage compartments. It's unbelievable what I can put in this boat. And then all my fishing gear, and stuff to keep it clean and entertain, like if I'm going to have a charter, I have an ice bucket and fancy napkins and champagne glasses and all this stuff under the seat next to the helm. It's ready for anything at all times."

As someone who put 365 hours on her engines in the last year alone, she's definitely qualified to make such a statement. "I'm on my boat every day that the sun is shining and it's not blowing a gale," Kim says with a smile.

And if you're wondering whether the 276 DC can live up to the demands of two very active kids requiring many summers' worth of entertainment, rest assured that Camp Mom has produced two very happy campers.





That old saying, "When you love something, let it go," may make sense for romance novels and wild animals, but when it comes to boat design, the exact opposite principle applies. As the team at Sailfish set about creating a new dual console model to satisfy demand in the 30- to 35-foot range, they began by considering what boaters loved about past and current models — and made sure to keep everything that stirred affection.

"We like to ask our customers, 'What do you want to keep?' when we start looking at a new addition to a series," explains Sailfish Vice President of Product Development & Engineering Paul Hoppes. "We poll our boaters and dealers to make sure we hang onto all the features and benefits they enjoy, even as we modify and shape everything to suit modern tastes and reflect the latest technology."

Dual console models have experienced a surge in popularity in recent years, thanks in large part to their incredible versatility and safe, family-friendly layouts. The Sailfish 245 and 276 DC are a testament to this popularity, as were two previous models, the retired 275 and 325 DC. These four boats served as a foundation for development of the coming 316 Dual Console.

Ergonomics were the number-one thing Paul and his team preserved, carrying over Sailfish's high freeboard and easy flow from one area of the boat to the next. The 316 DC will have one of the best depths of cockpit in its class, which adds a distinct sense of safety and security. "This boat is incredibly kid-friendly, friendly for older passengers, and it gives you something to lean against if you're reaching to pull a fish or your kid from the water," Paul says. "Plus, it helps to keep the spray out, so everyone stays dry and comfortable."



At the same time, the team recognized a need to improve visibility over what the 325 DC had offered. Sailfish worked with the experts at Taylor Made to craft the best windshield in the industry, producing a frameless, full-height design that delivers 25 percent more visibility than a typical dual console's windshield. A new center sliding windshield panel eliminates the need to flip over a heavy pane of glass; instead, the door glides over the passenger side and locks into place, allowing easy access to the bow while maintaining optimal visibility.

Storage was another aspect that customers identified as crucial, so Sailfish designed the 316 DC with "as much storage as we possibly could," Paul says. That includes a large ski and rod storage locker in the cockpit, forward in-deck storage, a built-in bow cooler, under-seat compartments and more.

When it comes down to it, the details are every bit as important as the big picture, and in fact they can make all the difference between a frustrating or fantastic boating experience. Sailfish paid close attention to the small things boaters need, as well as the large ones. For example, they added a tinted glass skylight in the head area, with privacy glass, adding natural light and eliminating that sense of being in a cave when you're below deck.

Quality fit-and-finish is always a priority at Sailfish; a great example of this is the 316 DC's standard anchor windlass and shoot through. What makes this feature special is that its protective chaff plate is secured from the

inside (rather than leaving the screw heads visible from the outside), giving it a high-quality look and feel.

Another detail that's sure to be a crowd-pleaser: The 316 Dual Console features a sandbar cooler on the portside swim platform. That means anyone swimming or floating around during a raft-up can help themselves to a cold beverage without having to climb back into the boat. Staying hydrated on hot days has never been more fun.

On the big-picture end of the spectrum, the 316 DC is uniquely configured to have a universal deck height. That means no matter where you're sitting, bow to stern, you and your fellow passengers are all at the same level. "We heard complaints that with some of the other boats out there similar to this one, with the seat heights varying between one social zone of the boat versus the next, there was this feeling of being at a whole different party. You turn around and it's like, "This person is two feet below me!'," Paul says. "We wanted to eliminate that height difference, so everyone feels included and the conversation flows freely."

The 316 DC is also unique in its modular design, which allows customers to choose the setup that works best for their preferred activities. If entertaining is your primary goal, the cockpit galley option is perfect for pouring drinks, making smoothies, prepping snacks and so on. Or if maximum relaxation is your preference, the available rear-facing lounge seat includes a fold-down side that transforms into a full-sized lounger. No trade-offs required: this option still includes a galley.

Of course, it wouldn't be a Sailfish without considerable fishing capabilities. The 316 DC is the most fishing-equipped dual console out there, with all the amenities you need for angling success: rod holders, livewells, fish boxes, electronics options, and more. A portside dive door is another unique feature that aids in dragging a large catch onboard, as well as entering and exiting the water.

Thanks to the 6th-generation Variable Degree Stepped hull (a Sailfish exclusive), performance and ride quality are unsurpassed, whether racing offshore at dawn for the day's first catch, taking a leisurely cruise at dusk, or pulling the occasional wakeboarder or tuber from the integrated pull-up ski tow bar — a feature that will be part of the optional Comfort Package, available on every Sailfish model (except the 320 CC and 360 CC).



The brilliant thing about a walk around boat model is the way it combines the open-cockpit layout feeling of a center console with the comfort and convenience of a cuddy cabin. For a lot of people, the Sailfish 220 Walk Around is truly a "best of both worlds" boat, combining family-friendly amenities with the serious fishing ability that is synonymous with the Sailfish name.

Owner Tyler Dickinson is one of those people. As an avid angler living in Holualoa, Hawaii, Tyler needed a boat that could deliver big-water performance and the right tools for fishing success. As a caring husband and father to two young daughters, ages 7 and 4, he also wanted a boat that would keep everyone safe and happy on long outings. By choosing the 220 WAC, he was able to check all the boxes on his list — and even some he didn't anticipate.

"One of the things I was immediately impressed with was the size of the cabin," Tyler recounts. "Friends of mine with larger boats have said to me, 'Wow, that's even bigger than what's on my 25!"

He landed on Sailfish after poring over online forums, considering a variety of other brands that he ultimately ruled out. Some were too expensive for what they delivered; others were lacking in quality or versatility. With Sailfish, Tyler found, he was getting a ton of bang for his boating buck. "As a friend of mine told me, 'Sailfish are just as good as any top-of-the-line boat, they're just not as well-known out on the West Coast," he says. "Well, they should be!"

As his research showed, Sailtech construction meant the boats were ultra-reliable and built to provide years of hassle-free enjoyment. Variable Degree Stepped (VDS) hull design meant the Dickinsons would enjoy a soft, dry, safe ride, even as they ventured out into the wide blue Pacific Ocean. Thoughtful design and purposeful engineering meant the family would have all the features and storage they needed to participate in a full array of fishing and family activities. "One main reason we chose the Walk Around was for the kids," Tyler explains. "It gives them a place to hang out with all their stuffed animals and blankets. I'll get them out of the house with me at 5 AM, they're content to hang out down there for the first part of the day while I fish, and my wife can stay home and sleep in."

The Dickinsons found that the 220 Walk Around offered the right amount of space and seating, including the optional rear jump seats, and a perfect mix of amenities for fishing and playing. For starters, the standard Porta-Potti in the cabin is a welcome convenience, as is the high-low table that converts to form a berth. A walkthrough transom door and 3-step boarding ladder provide easy access to and from the water. Sailfish's exclusive dot-matrix textured flooring helps prevent anyone from slipping and sliding around the deck. The boat is also available with a retractable ski tow bar, making it well-suited to pulling the kids on a tube. Other popular options include a pair of 25-quart Igloo coolers and underwater LED lights.

For anglers, the available Offshore Tournament Package adds a powder-coated hardtop with a built-in radio box and transom rod holders. Tyler often heads out with a close friend, his girls and his father-in-law to put the Walk Around's fishing features through their paces. Within their first few months of owning the boat, they had already experienced big success.

"In the first 6 weeks alone, we put more than 20 hours on the engine," Tyler says of his 220's 200-hp Yamaha outboard. "We've caught a 140-pound tuna, a 90-pounder and a 93-pounder. The Sailfish is definitely set up to fish."

He can also feel confident bringing his family out, knowing the boat will reliably get them home. The Walk Around's high free-board means the tall sides keep everyone safely inside the boat, whether craning to spot sea turtles or leaning over to haul in a tuna. Wide deck walkways and tall bow railings allow for safe, easy access to the bow, explaining the boat's "walk around" name. And thanks to the VDS hull and its reverse chine, the 220 also excels at keeping everyone dry and comfortable.

"The boat looks great, it rides great, and it has plenty of power. It actually goes a lot faster than I thought it would," Tyler says. "Plus, the size is perfect for trailering from our house to the marina and back."

As an added bonus, the boat is a head-turner, drawing admiring looks even amidst all the beautiful Hawaiian scenery. "Pretty much every time we take it out, we get compliments," Tyler says. "We've even had people take pictures of it, saying 'I want one of these someday!"

For families looking to enjoy memorable boating adventures, saying "aloha" to a Sailfish Walk Around is a wise first step.


